No chance for weather issues for the meeting in July. We are meeting at the Commerce Bank Education Center of the Missouri Botanical Garden, commonly abbreviated CBEC. You know the place where we had BBQ and heard the owl man speak back in February.

July is AUCTION month. The Auction is open to all who love hosta and are willing to buy. Make sure you tell everyone you know. There will be hostas donated by individual gardeners, the Missouri Botanical Garden and Bob Solberg of Green Hill Farms Nursery. It will be an opportunity to get something different for your garden or maybe something you are searching for. The auctioneers will be Janelle Criscione and Gene Pulliam. It will be lots of fun so make sure to mark your calendar.

July is also the month you should be checking your garden for southern blight. It is the hot humid time of year that Sclerotium rolfsii fungus loves. It is in the soil, so drench the soil well with anything that contains Tebuconazole. This is what is done at the Missouri Botanical Garden. Starting in April, every month the hostas crowns and soil get sprayed. There may still be some plants that show signs of the fungus, but that is taken care of with a 10% bleach solution. It will stop the fungus this year and the plant will regrow. Consider spraying that area of your garden early next year because the fungus is in the soil.

Gardening is not always easy but you can always find the answers from fellow hosta gardeners.

#### **Directions:**

Note that at this location Shaw is split into two sections one heading East and another section heading West. O'Connell's Pub sits in between the two sections of Shaw. The entrance to the parking lot for CBEC is on the West heading section. After turning East onto Shaw, travel to the end of O'Connell's Pub parking lot and then turn left onto the West heading section. The gated entrance to CBEC is on the right.
